Prison official said that the telephone facilities have been made available in most of the jails so that the prisoners could speak to their family members or lawyers from time to time. But despite that cell phones are being illegally smuggled inside the

prison, which could be for illegal activities and hence regular checks are being done.

Similarly, two officials from Kolhapur Central prison were suspended last week after six mobile phones were found inside the jail, confirmed Swati Sathe, deputy inspector general of prison, West Region. As head of the prison, Sadafule was supposed to take serious cognizance of the seizure of the cellphones. But he failed to take necessary action as mandated by prison department's rules, therefore he is facing an inquiry, the officer added.

A jail official said that by the orders of Amitabh Gupta, additional director general

(prisons), regular checking was being done by the prison department. In Yerawada Central prison, more than 10 cellphones were found. Following this, one officer and 14 prison personnel of constabulary level were transferred to various other departments, the senior officer said.

Yerawada and Kolhapur prison authority Mr Sathe said "The cellphones seized in Yerawada and Kolhapur prisons was a result of attentiveness and watchful prison officials and those responsible for the negligence are facing punishment and inquiry. In May this year, she reached Nepal via Dubai and spent some time in the tourist city of Pokhara in the Himalayan nation. Seema's husband, Gulam Haider, who stays in Saudi Arabia, has made an appeal to the Government of India via a video message to help him reunite with his wife. In the video, he says that he got to know that his wife and children were in Noida, through the Indian media.

Although both Seema and Sachin seem very happy, Sachin's family has quite a mixed reaction to her being here. Seema is a mother of four children who are also here with her. Seema is living with her husband's family. Ever since she came from Pakistan, Seema Haider has been in awe of Indian culture and lifestyle. Not only has she converted to Hinduism, Seema has also given up her favourite food -

chicken biryani, meat and fish. The Pakistani 'Bhabhi' is trying hard to wholeheartedly embrace Indian culture and doing everything to assimilate herself into Indian society. This Pakistani woman grabbed a lot of eyeballs after she and Sachin Meena, 25, were arrested by the authorities on July 4. While Seema was charged with illegally entering India, Sachin was booked for sheltering the illegal immigrant. Seema was accused of illegally entering India without a valid visa via Nepal with her four children, all aged below seven years, to live with her lover Sachin.

Seema Haider has converted to Hinduism and wears a Radhe-Radhe strap around her neck. She can be seen greeting guests with folded hands, seeking blessings by touching the feet of elders, and engaging in prayer. Haider, who hails from Sindh province in Pakistan and lived in Karachi after her first marriage, claimed that her husband divorced her over the phone and they have not been in touch. The court has however put a condition on Haider – she has been asked to not change her residence till the case was ongoing. It was reported that the couple has been asked to mark their presence before the court regularly. The couple has become famous on the internet and are being referred to in both countries as the real-life Veer Zara – a reference to a popular Bollywood movie by the same name which tells the story of two star-crossed lovers from India and Pakistan.

Court Grants interim maintenance to woman having three pets



court in Mumbai recently observed that "pets are also part and parcel of a decent lifestyle and they are necessary for human beings to lead a healthy life as they fulfill the emotional deficit that occurred on account of broken relationships."

The magistrate court made these observations while allowing a plea by a 55-year-old woman under the Domestic Violence (DV) Act, who sought maintenance from her estranged husband citing her age, health issues and three Rottweiler dogs dependent on her.

The court said the mainte-

nance amount cannot be mitigated on the husband's claim that the ground taken by the woman seeking maintenance for pets cannot be considered. It allowed the woman's plea, directing the estranged husband to pay her Rs 50,000 per month as interim maintenance till final disposal of her plea.

Metropolitan Magistrate Komal singh Rajput on June 20 passed an order in an interim application filed by the woman for the maintenance in her main plea under Section 12 of Protection of Women from Domestic Violence Act, 2005. The order was made

available this month.

Advocate Shweta R Moray, representing the applicant, informed the court that the couple got married in 1986 and have two married daughters residing abroad. "After a considerable period of settled married life, some differences occurred and in the year 2021, the respondent estranged husband sent the woman to Mumbai (from southern metro city), assuring her of providing maintenance and other basic necessities. But he has not followed his promise," Moray argued.

The applicant woman further claimed that the respondent man had indulged in domestic violence against her when they were together. Moray submitted that her client has no source of income and suffered from health issues. Three dogs are also dependent on her, besides other requirements, Moray said.

The woman added that the respondent husband is running business in another metro city and has other sources of income, therefore he should pay interim maintenance of Rs 70,000 per month to her.

Four FIRs were registered at the Vanrai police station in connection with the fatal crashes reported on this stretch between March and July. There have been other crashes as well that left road users grievously injured.

Conman who duped over 28 citizens of valuables held

50-year-old conman who duped people by posing as a well-intentioned individual and fled with their valuables was arrested by the Kasturba Marg police recently. Accused Sanjay Mangde has tricked at least 28 people in the past, police said. He is part of a gang and the police are looking for his accomplices. In the latest incident reported in Borivli on June 23,

Mangade approached a senior citizen and pretended they were old acquaintances. Mangade told him that he was the owner of several shops on the street and had heard that cops were carrying out checks. He adviced the senior citizen to put away his ornaments and money safely. While keeping the elderly man engaged in conversation, Mangade relieved him of valuables worth Rs 75,000.

25 plates of samosas cost doctor Rs 1.4L in cyber scam

In another message the accused sent him bank details for the payment. The man who claimed to be calling from the eatery asked the victim to send him the screenshots of the payments.

CBI seeks time to procure prosecution sanctions against Lalu Yadav, others in land-for-job scam



he Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) on Wednesday informed the Rouse Avenue Court that it will take a month to procure prosecution sanctions against former Railways Minister Lalu Prasad Yadav and certain railways officials in relation to the fresh chargesheet filed in land-for-job matter. Noted the CBI's submissions Special Judge Geetanjali Goel deferred the arguments on the point of cognisance for August 8.

Recently, CBI has filed a chargesheet in a land-for-job alleged scam case of former Union Railway Minister Lalu Prasad Yadav naming Bihar's Deputy Chief Minister Lalu Prasad Yadav and others including Tejashwi Yadav etc.

According to the CBI, this is the 2nd chargesheet in the Designated Court against 17 accused including the then Union Minister of Railways, his wife, son, then GM of West Central Railways(WCR), then two CPOs

of WCR, private persons, private company etc. in a case related to Land for Job Scam CBI had registered a case on May 18, 2022, against the then Union Minister of Railways and 15 others including his wife, two daughters and unknown public servants and private persons. It was alleged that the then Union Minister of Railways during the period 2004-2009 had obtained pecuniary advantages in the form of transfer of landed property in the name of his family members etc. in lieu of appointment of Substitutes in Group "D" Post in different Zones of Railways.

It was further alleged that in lieu thereof the substitutes, who were residents of Patna themselves or through their family members sold & gifted their land situated at Patna in favour of the family members of said Minister and a private company controlled by his family members, which was also involved in transfer of such immovable properties in the name of said family members. NIA Court sentences four IM Operatives to 10 years rigorous imprisonment

he NIA court of Delhi on Wednesday sentenced four Indian Mujahideen (IM) operatives to 10 years of Rigorous Imprisonment each for hatching a criminal conspiracy to wage war against the country by conducting terrorist attacks. They were recently convicted by the court under various sections of the IPC and the stringent Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA).

The court, while ordering the conviction, noted that in this case charges were framed against said four convicts for the above-said offences and they pleaded guilty to all the charges and accepted their role for the offences and vide judgment dated 07.07.2023, all above named four convicts were convicted for the above-said offences. The Court had convicted four Indian Mujahideen (IM) operatives namely Danish

Ansari, Aftab Alam, Imran Khan and Obaid-Ur-Rehman for hatching a criminal conspiracy to wage war against the Country by conducting terrorist attacks across the country.

Special Judge Shailender Malik while passing a sentencing order against Danish Ansari stated that convict Danish Ansari is in judicial custody since 21.01.2013, has not been involved in any other criminal case and is stated to be educated upto higher secondary, therefore he is ordered to be sentenced Rigorous Imprisonment (RI)of 10 years and a fine of Rs.2,000/- for offence u/s 18 UA(P) Act, in default of payment of fine to further undergo SI for 06 months. He is further sentenced to undergo RI for 10 years for offence u/s 38(2) of the UA(P) Act as well as RI for 10 years for offence u/s 39(2) of the UA(P) Act, he added. ANI

SC to hear various pleas relating to stray dog issue in Kerala on August 16

The Supreme Court on Wednesday said that it will hear on August 16 on pleas relating to the stray dog issue in Kerala. The court also asked concerned parties to file reply to the pleas filed by Kannur Panchayat and Kerala Child Rights body.

Kerala State Commission for Protection of Child Rights has moved an application seeking to intervene as party in the case and apprised the top court that the Commission has received many complaints about the nuisance of stray dogs and the plight of children who have been fatally bitten by them and the Commission has also take suo-motu case on several such incidents. Kerala State Commission for Protection of Child Rights, in its application, told the court that there are large numbers of dog bite incidents reported across the state, especially against children.

The commission mentioned that 5,794 stray dogs attacks were reported in 2019, 3951 cases in 2020, 7927 cases in 2021,



11776 cases were reported in 2022 and 6276 cases are reported upto 19th June, 2023. "After the death of the child named Nihal, repeated attacks from stray dogs is being reported. Stray dogs do not have the lame nature of a faithful domesticated dog. It is just like a vermin and when they gathered their attacking nature will be showed and become dangerous," the commission said in its application. During the hearing the court remarked that can it be human and dog conflict. The court made these when various lawyers apprised the court about their suggestions relating to the issue. ANI

Caveat filed in SC in matter pertaining to Rahul Gandhi's conviction in defamation case by Guiarat Court

urnesh Ishwerbhai Modi, the complainant who filed a defamation case against Congress leader Rahul Gandhi in Gujarat, has filed a caveat in the Supreme Court in the matter pertaining to the Gujarat High Court decision denying to stay Rahul Gandhi's conviction in the defamation case against 'Modi surname' remark. Purnesh Ishwerbhai Modi also wants to be heard in the case when the apex court takes up Gandhi's appeal against the Gujarat High Court's decision declining to stay his conviction in a defamation case.

A Caveat application is filed by a litigant to ensure that no adverse order is passed against them without being heard.

Gujarat High Court on Friday upheld the Sessions Court's order and denied a stay on his conviction in the defamation case against the 'Modi surname' remark. As there is the possibility that Rahul Gandhi will challenge



the petition in Supreme Court, Purnesh Ishwerbhai Modi has filed a caveat in the top court so that he must be heard before the top court passed any direction if the matter is heard.

The Gujarat HC court had refused to grant any interim relief to Rahul Gandhi. The Congress leader had moved the Gujarat High Court on April 25 challenging the Surat sessions court order which declined to stay his conviction in the criminal defamation case. The Surat sessions court had on April 20 rejected Rahul Gandhi's plea seeking a stay on his conviction by the lower court in the criminal defamation case. ANI

As NATO summit begins, Russia intensifies attack on Ukraine

s the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) member countries met in Lithuania's capital Vilnius, Russia intensified its attack on Ukraine in the early hours of Wednesday. CNN reported that for the second night in a row, Moscow launched airstrikes toward the Kyiv region. Kyiv regional military administration, on Telegram, said, "The movement of enemy UAVs has been recorded! Air defence works in the region."

The strikes come following an overnight attack on Monday in which Ukraine's air defence shot down drones launched by Russia. Earlier, Russia's Defense Minister Sergey Shoigu warned of retaliation if the United States continues with plans to supply cluster munitions to Ukraine. "In the event that the United States supplies cluster munitions to Ukraine, Russia will be forced to respond in a reciprocal manner," Shoigu said, according to Russian television network Channel 5, which carried his comments, reported CNN.

This came after the US confirmed last week that it will send cluster munitions to Ukraine as part of a new military aid package, following months of debate within the Biden administration about whether to provide Kyiv with the controversial weapons banned by over 100 countries, including key US allies. Mean-



while, at the Nato Summit in Vilnius, the member countries reaffirmed their support for Ukraine's push for membership of the alliance, according to a final declaration issued by the 31-member group at a summit in Lithuania, according to a joint communique

issued by NATO leaders at a summit in Vilnius. NATO allies in the joint communique said, "We fully support Ukraine's right to choose its own security arrangements. Ukraine's future is in NATO. We reaffirm the commitment we made at the 2008 Summit in Bu-

a member of NATO, and today we recognise that Ukraine's path to full Euro-Atlantic integration has moved beyond the need for the Membership Action Plan. "NATO allies noted that Ukraine has become "increasingly interoperable and politically integrated" with the alliance. The NATO allies said that they will continue to support and review Ukraine's progress through the adapted annual national programme. NATO allies also reiterated their condemnation of Russia's war and its "blatant violations of international law, the Charter of the United Nations, and OSCE commitments and principles." ANI

Trump's legal team seek postponement of documents trial



he legal team of United States' former President Donald Trump has asked the federal judge to postpone his trial on charges of illegally retaining classified documents after he left office, said that the proceeding should not begin until all "substantive motions" in the case were resolved, The New York Times reported. The former president's legal team, on Mon-

day, argued in a court filing that no trial date should be set until all "substantive motions" in the case were resolved, setting up an early key decision by Judge Aileen M. Cannon.

If granted, it could push Trump's trial into the final stages of the presidential campaign in which he is now the Republican front-runner or even past the 2024 election. While timing is

important in any criminal matter, it could be hugely consequential in Trump's case, in which he stands accused of illegally holding on to 31 classified documents after leaving the White House and obstructing the government's repeated efforts to reclaim them. The filing came in response to one submitted last month by prosecutors working for the special counsel Jack Smith who requested a trial date of December 11. Judge Cannon, appearing to adopt the brisk calendar mandated by the Speedy Trial Act, had initially scheduled the case to go to trial in August, reported The New York Times.

Trump's lawyers pitched their request to Judge Cannon as a plea for cautious deliberation and as a means of safeguarding democracy. ANI

South Korea says North Korea fired ballistic missile towards East Sea

orth Korea on Wednesday fired an unspecified ballistic missile towards the East Sea, Yonhap news agency reported citing the South Korean military. South Korea's Joint Chiefs of Staff announced that it detected the ballistic missile launch. It did not give further details regarding the launch, the report said. Pyongyang fired the ballistic missile amid tensions caused by North Korea's accusations against US Spy aircraft operations earlier this week. Previously, North Korea launched the ballistic missile on Jun 15, Yonhap news agency reported.

North Korea has accused the

United States of illegally flying over the economic zone eight times and warned of counter-action, state media Korean Central News Agency (KCNA) reported on Tuesday.

Kim Yo Jong, North Korean leader Kim Jong Un's sister, in a press statement, said, "In case of repeated illegal intrusion, the US forces will experience a very critical flight." She also claimed that South Korea had again impudently taken the lead in denying the encroachment on North Korea's sovereignty and still the nation assert that it was a "normal flight of the 'ROK' and the US." ANI

Afghanistan: Four people publicly flogged by Taliban

aliban's Supreme Court has announced that four people including a woman have been publicly flogged on accusations of committing "immorality" in Kabul's Paghman district, Khaama Press reported. The Khaama Press is an online news service for Afghanistan.

As per a news release, the people were arrested from Kabul's Kargha area. The convicts have been sentenced to three months of imprisonment by Taliban officials.



Taliban's Supreme Court in a press release on Wednesday stated that after the verdict was issued, Taliban officials publicly lashed criminals in the Paghman district court in the presence of government officials and some common people.

Each convict was sentenced to twenty lashes and one-month imprisonment, the news release stated. The Taliban after seizing power in August 2021, resumed practising physical punishment among the ordinary people. Meanwhile, Human Rights advocacy groups have repeatedly stated in their reports that convicts do not have access to a legal and standardized judicial system in Afghanistan under the Taliban. ANI

Marriage in China: Young people reject tying knot, but why?

hina's slow economy, high unemployment rate and the wave of corporate layoffs have become major decision drivers in the younger generation's lives that they continue postponing major life decisions and contribute to a record-low marriage-rate" > marriage rate, The New York Times reported. Grace Zhang, a tech worker who had long been ambivalent about marriage, spent two months in the barricaded space during the lockdown of Shanghai last year. And when she came out of lockdown, her sense of optimism faded.

When China reopened in December, Zhang felt that working back in the office could help her in restoring the positive outlook but the rising layoffs have just confused her. She has a boyfriend but no immediate plans to marry, despite frequent admonishments from her father that it's time to settle down, according to New York Times. "This kind of instability in life will make people more and more afraid of making new life changes," she said.

The number of marriages in China declined for nine consecutive years, falling by half in less than a decade. Last year, about 6.8 million couples registered for marriage, the lowest since records began in 1986, down from 13.5 million in 2013, according to government data released last month. ANI

dolescent counseling is counseling (or therapy) specifically for children and teens who need help with their mental health. Child and adolescent counseling is beneficial to truly any young person. But for those who suffer, it's critical. Mental health counseling can prevent adolescents from experiencing mental health crises and also help those in need of extra mental health support.

Adolescent counseling is essential for an adolescent who is dealing with anxiety, depression, or trauma. 
