SECURITY BEEFED UP AT HARYANA'S NUH DISTRICT AFTER COMMUNICE CIVESTI

communal clash broke out during the 'Brij Mandal Jalabhishek Yatra' taken out by Bajrang Dal and Vishwa Hindu Parishad (VHP) killing at least five people, including two home guards. Twelve police personnel were also injured in the violence. The injuries were allegedly sustained from gunshots and stone pelting. The Vishwa Hindu Parishad (VHP) has announced a nationwide strike on Wednesday in the aftermath of the violence in Nuh.

VHP Joint General Secretary Surendra Jain said Terming the incidents that have unfolded "very unfortunate", alleges that an estimated 20,000 participants of the yatra were attacked within 15 to 20 minutes of assembling at the venue. He alleged that those who were part of the yatra, including women and children, had to seek shelter in temples and police chowkis.

Deputy Chief Minister Dushyant Chautala said "We will spare no culprit and strict action would be taken against those behind the communal clashes in Haryana. The situation is under control and government is trying its level best to maintain the law-and-order situation".

"This was the fourth year of the yatra, this time the official management was not at its best because key police official was absent. There was an incident yesterday and I feel that the management was not at its best. The Superintendent of Police, Nuh was on leave due to a family situation and the charge was given to the SP of a neighbouring district who could not assess the situation in a better manner" asserted Chautala

Haryana Home Minister Ani Vij said " Someone who wanted to disturb the peace in Haryana engineered the violence in Nuh. The level of violence that took place and also occurred at different points, the way stones were collected, the way weapons were wielded, the way shots were fired, it does not appear to have happened all of a sudden," said Vij. Both the communities live peacefully there, he said.

Five men have been arrested for their alleged involvement in the violence in Gurgaon where a mosque was set on fire in the early hours of Tuesday, the police said. The death toll in Haryana's communal flare-ups mounted to 4 on Tuesday after the naib imam of the Anjuman Jama Masjid was killed after the mosque located in in Sector 57 was torched allegedly by a mob of 70-80 people.

A curfew imposed in Haryana's Nuh district. The situation in Nuh continues to be tense. However, there were no re-

ports of any fresh violence on Tuesday.

Congress MLA Jagbir Singh Malik told Afternoon Voice, "This procession was done every year at that time there was no violence why this issue has erupted now when the election is nearby? It seems this is a pre-planned situation but we request government to take strict action against it and maintain peace in the state as we all are equal".

Samajwadi Party National Spokesperson said **Kapish Shrivastava**, "We don't want any politics in this issue but during this tension, the state government should maintain law and order situation in the state to bring peace".

"It seems that BJP is not serious about their work as we can see the situation in Manipur. So we want government should investigate the matter" Shrivastava further added.

The Uttar Pradesh gangsters gunned down one after another

criminal and gangster Sanjeev Maheshwari Jeeva was an aide of gangster-politician Mukhtar Ansari who was gunned down a few months back. Gangster-turned-politician Mukhtar Ansari's close aide Sanjeev Maheshwari alias Jeeva was shot dead inside SC/ST Court in Lucknow. A policeman and a six-year-old girl also suffered injuries in the attack. The attacker came in the attire of an advocate and when Jeeva was about to leave the court, he extensively opened fire. The modus operandi was similar to Mukhtar Ansari's murder. Ansari and his brother were killed by the guys who pretended to be journal-

ists. According to eyewitnesses, as soon as Sanjeev Maheshwari alias Jeeva in police custody reached the court premises, the assailant present there started firing targeting him. This created a stampede there. People started running and during the rush Jeeva fell on the ground in the court. During this, the advocates present there caught the attacker Vijay Yadav, then thrashed him ferociously, then when asked the reason for the murder, he only said that he had come to kill Jeeva, killing him.

Sanjeev Maheshwari Jeeva was a compounder who was fairly doing well, but the circumstances dragged him into crime and he became a member of the underworld. He was a close associate of Munna Bajrangi who was shot dead in 2018 in Baghpat jail. Munna Bajrangi was a carpet weaver. After a few independent killings, the first at the age of 17, he committed the first murder. he joined a gang in Uttar Pradesh led by Gajraj Singh. In an atmosphere where the moves of criminals becoming politicians was pioneered by gangsters like Raja Bhaiyya, DP Yadav and others, Bajrangi started his criminal career as a member of criminal-politician Mukhtar Ansari's gang. In the early 1990s, under the governance of Mulayam Singh Yadav's Samajwadi Party, criminals were flourishing in UP. In 1996, Mukhtar was elected from Mau, and the gang, with its arsenal of AK 47and other weapons, became a household name in the districts of Bhadohi Mau, Ghazipur, Varanasi and Jaunpur. The gangs made a living by gathering government contracts with political help.

Earlier this week, a court in Varanasi awarded life sentence to gangster-politician Mukhtar Ansari for the murder of a Congress leader's brother, Awadhesh Rai, more than 30 years ago. Awadhesh Rai, the brother of Congress leader Ajay Rai, was shot dead on August 3. After Munna Bajrangi's murder inside Baghpat Jail in 2018, Jeeva had claimed threat to his life. His involvement had come into light in the murder of BJP MLA Krishnanand Rai.

Rai, who was an MLA from Mohammadabad seat in Ghazipur district, was sprayed with bullets along with six others by a group of assailants armed with AK-47 assault rifles in 2005. Mukhtar Ansari and his brother Afzal Ansari were named as conspirators. Sanjeev Maheshwari, was a significant danger in western UP. After the assassination of

Munna Bajrangi, he allegedly aspired to rise to the position of a powerful don. He was a person of great terror even while imprisoned and serving his sentence.

While locked up, Bajrangi and Jeeva were keeping their eyes set on homes in western Uttar Pradesh and Uttarakhand. His meddling infuriated Sushil Mooch, and as a result, a clash of gangs broke out between Mooch and Jeeva. Mutual hostility in Haridwar over the valuable property close to the transport station grew to the point where several people were killed. In addition, Jeeva had a significant setback in 2018 with the death of the notorious Munna Bajrangi inside Baghpat Jail. He was reportedly given a life sentence for the murder of the former minister Dwivedi.

The government seized about 8 bighas (or about 5 acres) of land that belonged to the notorious Sanjeev Jeeva and his wife Payal Maheshwari. The land at Thana Adarsh Mandi and Sadar Kotwali was divided into two pieces. The land was estimated to have cost roughly Rs. 1.86 crore, Amarujala reported. The wheat crop on the farm was sold for Rs 9,000 at auction, and the money was put in the government's account. Sanjeev Jeeva, his wife, and their children were listed as the owners of 21 bighas of land in the hamlet of Adampur. In the names of his wife and sons, he had purchased this estate.

Elusive Consensus

India and China have once again appeared to be distancing themselves from their latest high-level engagement with various assessments of the strain on their relationship. India's concerns about the situation along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) were raised during a meeting between National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and top Chinese diplomat and Politburo member Wang Yi in Johannesburg earlier this week. Highlighted He said China's actions had "eroded" the "public and political basis" of the relationship. He "also emphasized the need to restore peace and tranquility in the border areas, so as to remove the usual obstacles in bilateral relations."

Meanwhile, after 18 rounds of talks, little clarity remains on the LAC situation and China's continued incursions into Demchuk and Depsang, the last two remaining friction points. While arrangements for setting up buffer zones at the other five points are welcome, the arrangements and terms of withdrawal from both sides are also under wraps. As both sides seek ways to stabilize relations and restore peace, the public must be kept informed. India's relations with its largest neighbor are too important to be overshadowed.

Species that spread venom

ndia has been witnessing an average 58,000 snakebite deaths in a year. The study has been conducted by the Centre for Global Health Research (CGHR) at the University of Toronto, Canada with Indian and UK partners and published in Life Journal. Most snakerelated deaths have occurred during monsoon. People enter uninhabited areas where shrubbery is thick and overgrown, leaving them vulnerable to the risk of a snakebite. The study has rightly suggested the use of rechargeable torches or mobile phone flashlights, wearing rubber boots and gloves. The increasing deforestation may also be one of the reasons for the reptiles to enter the human habitats and expose the people to grave risk of snake bites.

It was disheartening to note that animal bites in Maharashtra state are touching a new high. The reason for so many deaths due to snake bites is that the state is having a four-month period of monsoon and the water logging in several places lead to the sighting of snakes in the city and suburbs. As the snake bite is poisonous and there is no proper medical care, the victim dies after a struggle. Dog menace is also a cause for concern. Stray dogs are on the increase and they are not properly vaccinated and become rather troublesome to children and elders. This is a sad state of affairs. But human life is lost in such bites and Maharashtra stands third in the list of deaths occurred due to these bites. Tiger, Leopard and other dangerous animals cause other deaths and the State Government needs to act to avoid the menace. This is not the first time such a thing is happening and the authorities in charge of these animals

should make them wander inside an iron railing so that it will not harm the public in any way. Time and again, we hear that the man eater wanders in the gardens and the forest areas nearby giving the public sleepless nights. We have to preserve species like lions, tigers and Cheetah and not at the expense of human life.

Due to its biodiversity, India has been a home to many kinds of insects, bugs, arthropods, etc. Though most of these insects are small, they can still cause major damage to us, as well as our health. These Dangerous Indian Insects have the ability to kill humans as well as animals due to the high amount of venom in their body. Sometimes, the most beautiful things which we come across could be the deadliest. Here are some of the deadliest harmful insects, the giant black Indian scorpion, as well as the Indian red scorpion, is one of the most dangerous insects that one can come across in India. The Indian red scorpion ranks among the most harmful insect species in the world, and it only stings as a last resort.

Monsoons are the time when snakes come out — to play, hunt and mate. Their dens flooded, they seek refuge in dry patches where often the reticent reptile's cross paths with humans, resulting in a season of fatal snake bites every year. The toxicity of snakes depends on their geography, diet, season and various other factors. To make antivenoms that are effective in treating the local population, the venom needs to be extracted from the same region. Antivenoms made from venom of snakes found in Chennai will only be effective in the southern region, and its efficacy reduces with distance.

Apart from these harmful insects and creatures, there are many more dangerous Indian insects, as well as some dangerous creatures native only to India. This includes insects like the praying mantis, earthworm, spider, mupli beetle as well as the tiny caterpillar: to name a few. Spiders are usually found in plants, shrubs, grasses, flowering plants, leaf litter and sometimes under stones. The spider species weave webs to trap other insects and act as bio-controlling agents to keep the insect population under control. Spider families in India are not very much harmful to humans but spider bites known as arachnidism need treatment. Major regions of Indian spiders are distributed as Spiders of Kerala, South Indian Spiders, Spiders of Central India, Spider Families of Mumbai and Newly Discovered Spiders. Most commonly seen spiders are House spiders, Water spiders, Tree spiders, banana spiders and garden spiders.

Monsoon weather is a common time for all these venomous insects, spiders and snakes to come out. If there is excessive rain, then the snakes come out again when it is hot and they also come out in the open. It is better to have the areas around co-operative housing societies to provide sufficient lighting arrangements to avoid the snakes entering your compound. It is better to take precautions rather than paying the price for the snake bites.

Seventeen workers were killed and three injured as a crane fell on a bridge slab during construction of the third phase of Samruddhi Expressway in Maharashtra's Thane district on Tuesday, an official said.

Six of Marathwada's eight districts still rain-deficit



mid the peak of the monsoon season, six of the Leight districts in Maharashtra's Marathwada region are still witnessing a deficit in rainfall, with Parbhani receiving about 73 per cent of the expected rainfall till July end.

The Marathwada region comprises the districts of Aurangabad, Osmanabad, Jalna, Beed, Latur, Nanded, Hingoli and Parbhani. According to a report by the di-

visional commissioner, Parbhani district has received 266.6 mm of rainfall against the expected figure of 354.5 mm, which is about 73 per cent, as of July end.

Jalna has received 248.5 mm of rain, or 83 per cent, compared with 299 mm of expected rainfall, while it is 85.8 per cent for Aurangabad - 238.1 mm against 277.4 mm. The deficit in rainfall is a bit less in Osmanabad, Latur and Beed. (PTI)

Internet services suspended in Sohna, Pataudi and Manesar, informs Gurgaon Deputy Commissioner



urgaon Deputy Commissioner Nishant Kumar Yadav on Tuesday said that the internet have been suspended in Sohna, Pataudi and Manesar due to rumours circulating on social media after the Nuh violence.

'Because rumours were circulating, we have suspended internet services in Sohna, Pataudi and Manesar. An incident was reported from Gurgaon last night at around 12.20 am in sector 57. A part of a mosque was set on

fire. It was controlled and no major damage was sustained. The mosque was under construction but unruly elements attacked it. They had weapons. One person was shot dead. He died of bullet injuries. One more person was injured in the fire and he is in hospital. The police have rounded up five people. The situation is now peaceful,' he said.

In Sohna, we held a meeting with the leaders of both communities. A peach committee meeting was held. The political leaders were also present. We have appealed for peace. We have asked them to inform us of unruly elements. Markets have been opened. We carried out a flag march in the area," he further said.

"There are some rumours and fake messages circulating on social media, which are exaggerating the damage or people are claiming to be community leaders and asking people to gather to 'take revenge'. Our IT Cell is monitoring these channels and cases will be lodged against these elements and strict action will be taken. I request everyone to not pay heed to rumours. Our attempt will be to activate peace committees in the district so that peace prevails. During the day, we have got information that some people are gathering in groups, but our teams have disbanded them. No one is being asked to leave their houses, contrary to rumours. The situation is under control," said Yaday

Opposing the Delhi Ordinance Bill is wrong says Congress leader Sandeep Dikshit



ongress leader Sandeep Dikshit today said that opposing the Delhi Ordinance Bill would be wrong and that if power has to be goven to Delhi, it should be made a fullfledged state.

"BJP has a majority in Lok Sabha, this bill should be passed in the House. The bill is as per the status of Delhi. If you want to give powers to Delhi, then it should be made a full-fledged state....In my opinion, opposing this bill is wrong," he said.

The Delhi ordinance was promulgated by the Centre on May

19, a week after the Supreme Court handed over the control of services in Delhi, excluding police, public order and land, to the elected government headed by Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) leader and Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal. The ordinance sought to overturn the SC order that had given executive powers to the Delhi government in service matters, including the transfer and posting of officers. The proposed Bill is expected to cement the power of Lieutenant Governor VK Saxena to differ from the Delhi government's decision on service matters.

Famed art historian, educator Kavita Singh dies at 59

ghal, Rajput and Deccan art, and the role of museums — died of cancer on Sunday evening. She

Singh was among six eminent researchers in 2018 who won the Infosys Prize by the Infosys Science Foundation in the humanities category for her "extraordinarily illuminating study of Mughal, Rajput and Deccan art as well as her insightful writing on the historical function and role of museums and their significance in the increasingly fraught and conflicted social world in which visual culture exists today."

Delhi excise policy case: Court grants bail to businessman Dinesh Arora

he Rouse Avenue Court of Delhi on Tuesday granted bail to businessman, Dinesh Arora, in connection with an ongoing probe in the Delhi excise policy case. He was arrested by the Enforcement Directorate (ED) on July 6 and was in Judicial Custody until now.

The Special Judge MK Nagpal on Tuesday granted bail to Arora on a personal bail bond of Rs 1 lakh and like amount surety. Earlier, while seeking remand, ED counsels submitted that during the custody he has been confronted with certain persons and documents involved in relation to payment transfer of cash and proceeds of crime.

ED further stated that he has also revealed some crucial facts and names of individuals receiving proceeds of crime but on the basis of the information provided by the accused, some searches are being carried out in Delhi and NCR which will lead to recovery of incriminating material. Arora has been declared an approver in the same case being investigated by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI). Earlier Vikas Pahwa, senior counsel, appeared for Dinesh Arora and submitted that I have not seen the grounds of arrest. pls, see the background. It is a peculiar case Before the pardon was given on 16th November 2022, ED had called him in September. ANI

Bill to replace ordinance for control of services in Delhi introduced in Lok Sabha

bill to replace the ordinance for control of services in Delhi was introduced in Lok Sabha on Tuesday. Minister of State for Home Nityanand Rai introduced the Government of National Capital Territory of Delhi (Amendment) Bill, 2023.

Opposition members including Adhir Ranjan Chowdhury,

NK Premachandran and Shashi Tharoor opposed the introduction of the bill. Rejecting the contentions of opposition members, Home Minister Amit Shah said that Constitution has given the House power to pass any law regarding Delhi. He said the Supreme Court judgement has clarified that parliament can bring any law regarding Delhi and the opposition parties were opposing its introduction for political considerations.

The bill empowers the Central Government to make rules in connection with the affairs of the Government of National Capital Territory of Delhi including the functions, terms and other conditions of service of officers and employees. ANI

Over 1000 people infected with tuberculosis in Afghanistan's Kandahar in last six months



people were infected with tuberculosis in Afghanistan's Kandahar in the last six months, TOLO News reported. TOLO News is an Afghan news channel broadcasting from Kabul.

The province's health officials said children, women, and the elderly are among those afflicted by the disease. Head of the tuberculosis section in Kandahar's Public Health Department, Jamaluddin Azimi, said, "In the last six months, we had approximately 1,160 tuberculosis

patients, which has decreased by six and a half per cent compared to last year, and overall, the level of the disease among women is higher." Further, according to officials, lack of treatment is the main reason behind the spread of tuberculosis.

A resident of Zabul province's Shahjoy district, Khan Mohammad, said he has been in treatment for several months. "It has been 12 months since I was in treatment, but it did not benefit me. When I came here to the Doctors Without Borders centre,

I was treated, and the doctors said that I will get well," said Khan Mohammad, as per TOLO News, "I came here, the doctors treated me and helped me with everything, and now I am fine," said Abdul Ahad, a Helmand resident. Presently, 75 people suffering from tuberculosis are being treated at the Doctors Without Borders Hospital in Kandahar, most of whom are women and children, reported TOLO News.

Deputy of the Doctors Without Borders Centre in Kandahar, Mujeeb Rahman, said, "In the last six months, we have newly diagnosed and registered 415 people with tuberculosis in the Mirwais Hospital in Kandahar and Sarpouzeh Prison." Cough, fever, and weight loss are the main symptoms of tuberculosis. According to the World Health Organisation (WHO), many in Afghanistan die every year from tuberculosis. ANI

UNESCO recommends delaying decision on placing Great Barrier Reef on list of "in danger" World Heritage sites



NESCO has recommended delaying a decision to place the Great Barrier Reef on a list of "in danger" World Heritage sites, but has emphasised it remains under "serious threat" from climate change and pollution, ABC News reported. ABC News is a public news service produced by the Australian Broadcasting Corporation.

The Australian government's management of the reef was set to come under the microscope at an upcoming World Heritage Committee meeting where members were expected to vote on whether the reef should be la-

belled as "in danger". However, UNESCO in a report released overnight, recommended delaying that crucial decision for at least another year. Its draft recommendation said the Australian government had taken positive steps to protect the reef in the past 12 months.

But UNESCO said "urgent and sustained action" was still needed to improve the long-term resilience of the world's biggest coral ecosystem. The UN agency, which oversees World Heritage sites, had been considering whether the reef should be placed on its "In Danger" list. ANI

Recent bomb blast reveals toxic consequences of **Pakistan's dance with terrorism**



fter the recent bomb explosion that shook a rally in Pakistan, the lethal consequences of nurturing terrorism have come under the spotlight again. These horrifying incidents of violence, including the recent suicide bombing in Peshawar market, which claimed the lives of more than 50 people, have shown Pakistan the chaotic result of being a terrorism wellwisher, according to a report in Khalsa Vox.

The Islamic State Khorasan (ISKP), a banned terrorist organisation, was swift to claim responsibility for the atrocity. It was like tasting its own dish for Pakistan, as the country has long been a hospitable environment for terrorists, observed the Khalsa Vox report.

As per the publication, de-

spite the limited resistance from the Pakistani Government, these terrorist organisations continue to succeed in their heinous crimes with chilling ease. Accusations of Pakistan's intelligence agencies covertly supporting such groups have added to the public's dismay. The government's reluctance to deal with these malevolent entities has given rise to a breeding ground of terror that has only harmed the nation.

In the words of Hillary Clinton, "If you have snakes in your backyard, they won't just bite your neighbours." Terrorism, too, follows the same chilling principle. Should Pakistan continue to be a sanctuary for terrorists, they will eventually turn their fangs on their host. The recent bombings are but the latest cruel reminder of this imminent danger.

Hubble Space Telescope captures a planet's atmosphere being blasted away by a star

The Hubble Space Telescope has captured a nearby planet's atmosphere being blasted away by energetic outbursts from its star, CNN reported. The red dwarf star, called AU Microscopii, or All Mic is located outside of our solar system, 32 light-years from Earth, which is relatively close. It's home to one of the youngest planetary systems ever observed, and the star is less than 100 million years old, as per CNN.

NASA's now-retired Spitzer Space Telescope and the Transiting Exoplanet Survey Satellite discovered the system during observations in 2020. A slight dip in the star's brightness revealed the presence of a gaseous world orbiting in front of it.

When the Hubble Space Telescope observed one orbit of the exoplanet, which takes 8.46 days, everything seemed normal. Then, the telescope revisited the system for another look a year and a half later. Astronomers were surprised to see that AU Mic b, the closest planet to the star, is bearing the brunt of the star's radiation, which is evaporating the planet's hydrogen atmosphere. There are at least two known exoplanets in the system, and more may await discovery, according to CNN. The latest findings are part of a study that has been accepted for publication in a future edition of The Astronomical Journal. ANI

Death toll in Ukraine's Kryvyi Rih attack rises to six, at least 75 injured

The death toll has risen to six in Ukraine's Kryvyi Rih attack that also left at least 75 injured, Al Jazeera reported citing the officials. The city of Kryvyi Rih witnessed a Russian attack on Monday that resulted in widespread damage.

The search and rescue efforts in the area, according to Anton Gerashchenko, advisor to the Ukrainian minister of internal affairs, have come to an end. He



shared images of a woman and her 10-year-old daughter who perished in the attack on the social media site X. Igor Klymen-

ko, the minister of the interior of Ukraine, also verified the death toll on Telegram, according to Al Jazeera.
