PM Modi launches Wishwakarma Yofana¹ for traditional artisans, craftsmen; oppn terms it 'jumla' ahead of election

The first phase of the state-of-theart India International Convention and Expo Centre (IICC)—Yashobhoomi-at Dwarka, which cost Rs 5,400 crore, was officially opened by Prime Minister Narendra Modi. The PM Vishwakarma Yojana (scheme) for traditional artisans and craftsmen is worth Rs 13,000 crore.

The goal of the Vishwakarma scheme is to enhance the accessibility and quality of products and services offered by traditional artisans and craftsmen.

Under the PM Vishwakarma scheme,

artisans and craftspeople will be provided recognition through a PM Vishwakarma certificate and ID card and credit support up to Rs 1 lakh (the first tranche) and Rs 2 lakh (the second tranche) with a concessional interest rate of 5 per cent.

A concessional rate of interest of 5 per cent will be charged to the beneficiary, with an interest subvention cap of 8 per cent to be paid by the Ministry of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises. The credit guarantee fees will be borne by the central government.

With a total project area of over 8.9 lakh square metres and built-up area of more than 1.8 lakh square metres, 'Yashobhoomi'

will find its place among the world's largest MICE (Meetings, Incentives, Conferences, and Exhibitions) facilities

Opposition terms it another 'jumla'

Congress general secretary Jairam Ramesh said the people "won't be fooled again" and it is time for "Prime Minister Modi's retirement".

Ramesh further said, "Demonetisation and a flawed GST followed by a sudden lockdown during COVID-19 have been the biggest destroyers of micro and small enterprises in India." He said a majority of these small businesses are run by people who work with their hands-in textiles, leather, metalwork, woodwork, and other crafts.

Which craftsmen are covered by this scheme?

Artisans or craftsmen working with hands and tools and engaged in one of the 18 family-based traditional trades are eligible to avail themselves of the benefits of the scheme

These trades include carpenter; boat maker; armourer; blacksmith; hammer and toolkit maker; locksmith; goldsmith; potter; sculptor (moortikar, stone carver), stone breaker; cobbler; mason; basket/ mat/broom maker/coir weaver; doll & toy maker (traditional); barber; garland maker; washermen; tailor; and fishing net

Practice Self-control Techniques there are various techniques to boost self-control and strengthen willpower:



Ganesh Chaturthi celebration: People are opting for eco-friendly 'Bappas' despite of high prices



n environment-friendly celebration seems to be the plan this festive season, as more and more Mumbaikars are keen on bringing ecofriendly Ganesha idols home despite their high prices.

The city is gearing up to celebrate the 10-day Ganpati festival, which begins on September 19, and the markets are flooded with idols and decor items.

This year, eco-friendly Ganeshas seem to be all the rage, as people have become more aware of the ill effects of idols made of plaster of Paris (PoP). Rahul Vele, who runs his shop "Vele Brothers" in the Lalbaug area of central Mumbai, has been exclusively making eco-friendly Ganeshas for the last three years.

"I loved making Ganpati idols even as a child. In 2020, I started my own shop where I make eco-friendly idols, especially of clay because that is what the people want," the 23-year-old management graduate said. There is an increased awareness among people about the benefits of clay idols. They dissolve com-

pletely in water when immersed and are not harmful to the environment, he said. A one-foot eco-friendly idol costs around Rs 6,000, while a PoP one is for anywhere between Rs 3,000 to Rs 4,000. Despite this, people are willing to pay more for an environment-friendly idol, Vele said. Pankaj Mohne, a customer, said, "We have been bringing 'Bappa' home for 11 years, and we only have one rule the idol must be completely eco-friendly. It is our duty to conserve and protect nature, hence, we prefer a mud idol." "Though mud cannot be moulded as well as PoP and the idols may not look well crafted, but Bappa is Bappa," he said.

Mumbaikars throng the beaches, lakes, and ponds in and around the city on immersion days. Every year, the civic authorities take measures to prevent pollution of water bodies during the festival. **PTI**

Marathwada Liberation Day: CM Shinde says, "Hope central govt provides assistance to water grid project"



aharashtra Chief Minister Eknath Shinde on Sunday said he hoped the Union government will provide financial assistance for the ambitious water grid project in Marathwada.

Shinde, who was speaking at an event to commemorate Marathwada Liberation Day, also said he had made such a request to Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

The region, comprising eight districts, was under the oppressive rule of the Nizam of Hyderabad. An uprising of peasants and common citizens ensured the defeat of the Nizam and his Razakar militia and the region merged with India on September 17, 1948.

"We are trying to divert the run-off water during the monsoon towards the Godavari river basin. The state government has allocated Rs 15,000 crore for the ambitious Marathwada grid project. We have also requested Prime Minister Narendra Modi for (Central) assistance. I am sure we will get support from the Union government," he said. PTI

Anti-Narcotics Cell of Navi Mumbai police arrested nigerian person with cocaine worth Rs 5.7 lakh

Nigerian national has been arrested for alleged possession of cocaine worth Rs 5.7 lakh in Navi Mumbai, police said on Sunday.

Acting on a tip-off, the Anti-Narcotics Cell (ANC) of the Navi Mumbai police apprehended the accused from the Kharghar area on Saturday, an official said.

The ANC team recovered

57 gm of cocaine worth Rs 5.7 lakh from the accused, identified as Egbulem Michael Okewuch-ukwu, he said. An offence under relevant provisions of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act has been registered against the man, and a probe is underway to find out from where the contraband was sourced. **PTI**

Nashik-based training and placement institution's chief booked for cheating over govt's scheme

he head of a Nashikbased training and placement institution has been booked for allegedly cheating the government to the tune of Rs 79.49 lakh, a Navi Mumbai police official said on Sunday.

The institute was given a contract of Rs 79.49 lakh in 2015 under the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Rural Skill Development scheme to train people and place them in

jobs, he said. However, despite repeated reminders, the institute did not provide proof of having placed people in jobs post training, nor did it refund money provided to it by the government, the official said. An offence was registered on the complaint of a government official on Saturday, but no arrest has been made, the CBD Belapur police station official said. PTI

CJI Chandrachud says, "Integrity is the core of the legal profession" over strengthening legal system

ur profession will continue to thrive or it will self-destruct based on whether we do or do not maintain our integrity, Chief Justice of India Dhananjay Chandrachud said here on Sunday. Integrity is the core of the legal profession, the CJI asserted. Integrity is not eroded by one thunderstorm, it gets eroded by small, little concessions and compromises made by lawyers and judges, the CJI said while speaking at the an event on the theme 'Enhancing collaboration between Advocates & Judges: Towards strengthening legal system'.

"Our profession will continue to thrive or it will self-destruct based on whether we do or do not maintain our integrity. Integrity is eroded not by one thunderstorm, it erodes by small little concessions and compromises which are made by lawyers and judges," he said.

"We all sleep with our con-



science. You can fool the whole world but can't fool your conscience. It keeps on asking questions every night. Integrity is the core of the legal profession. With integrity we will either continue to survive or we will self-destruct," the CJI added. Lawyers get respect when they respect judges and judges get respect when they respect lawyers, and the mutual respect takes place when there is realisation that both

are part of the same wheel of justice, he said. Talking about women in the judiciary, he said gender is not a woman's issue alone and it was equally a man's issue. "I believe one significant challenge before the Indian legal profession is to create an equal opportunity profession. Because the composition of the legal profession today will define it 30 or 40 years down the line," CJI Chandrachud said. PTI



Libya Floods: An activist talks about challenges and help received from people



ahra el-Gerbi wasn't expecting much of a response to her online fundraiser, but she felt she had to do something after four of her relatives died in the flooding that decimated the eastern Libyan city of Derna. She put out a call for donations for those displaced by the deluge.

In the first half-hour after she shared it on Facebook, the Benghazi-based clinical nutritionist said friends and strangers were already promising financial and material support.

"It's for basic needs like clothes, foods and accommodation," el-Gerbi said. For many Libyans, the collective grief over the more than 11,000 dead has morphed into a rallying cry for national unity in a country blighted by 12 years of conflict and division. In turn, the tragedy has ramped up pressure on the country's leading politicians, viewed by some as the architects of the catastrophe. The oil-rich country has been divided between rival administrations since 2014, with an internationally recognized

government in Tripoli and a rival authority in the east, where Derna is located. Both are backed by international patrons and armed militias, whose influence in the country has ballooned since a NATO-backed Arab Spring uprising toppled autocratic ruler Moammar Gadhafi in 2011.

Numerous United Nationsled initiatives to bridge the divide have failed. In the early hours of September 11, two dams in the mountains upstream of Derna burst, sending a wall of water two stories high into the city and sweeping entire neighbourhoods out to sea. At least 11,300 people were killed and a further 30,000 displaced. An outpouring of support for the people of Derna followed. Residents from the nearby cities of Benghazi and Tobruk offered to put up the displaced. In Tripoli, some 1,450 kilometres (900 miles) west, a hospital said it would perform operations free of charge for any injured in the flood. PTI

Indian student death case: Community members in Seattle hold rally, demands justice

emanding sensitivity, respect and jail for killer police officers who were responsible for the killing of Indian student Jaahnavi Kandula, more than 100 members of the South Asian community held a rally on the site where she was struck and killed by a speeding police patrol car. Kandula, 23, was struck by a police vehicle driven by Officer Kevin Dave when she was crossing a street on January 23. He was driving 74 mph (more than 119 kmh) on the way to a report of a drug overdose call.

In bodycam footage released on Monday by the Seattle Police Department, Officer Daniel Auderer laughed about the deadly crash and dismissed any implication Dave might be at fault or that a criminal investigation was neces-

Over 100 members of the Seattle area's South Asian community gathered at Denny Park on Satur-



day and made their way to the intersection where Kandula was hit. They held signs saying "Jaahnavi had more value than Seattle Police Department" and "Justice for Jaahnavi, jail killer cops." The rally was put together by UTSAV, which means festival or celebration, an organisation based in Bothell that helps connect South Asians with their communities. "We're not a monolith, the Indian community," Rep. Vandana Slatter, D-Bellevue, said to the crowd. "There's diaspora in the community, but we are all united today." Video from the night of the crash has sparked international outrage over the officer's comments. PTI

Brazil plane crash incident at Amazon rainforest kills 14 people



small passenger plane crashed in Brazil's Amazon rainforest Saturday, killing all 14 people on board, Amazonas state Governor Wilson Lima announced. "I deeply regret the death of the 12 passengers and two crew members who were victims of the plane crash in Barcelos on Saturday," Lima said on X, formerly known as Twitter. The Embraer PT-SOG aircraft had taken off from Manaus, the Amazonas state capital and the biggest city in the Amazon, and was attempting to land in heavy rain when it

crashed, local media reported. The passengers were Brazilian tourists on their way to fish, the reports said. Video footage posted by the Globo television network showed the plane lying on a muddy dirt track with the front part of the aircraft in green foliage. A couple of dozen people are seen standing nearby holding umbrellas. The Brazilian air force sent a team from Manaus to collect information and preserve any evidence that could be used for the investigation into the crash, an air force statement said. PTI

South Korea's president says, "international community "will unite more tightly", will diuscuss at UN

outh Korea's president said the international community "will unite more tightly" to cope with deepening military cooperation between Russia and North Korea, as he pushes to raise the issue with world leaders at the U.N. General Assembly this week.

Worries about Russian-North Korean ties have flared since North Korean leader Kim Jong Un traveled to Russia last week for a summit with President Vladimir Putin and to tour a slew of high-profile military and technology sites. Foreign experts speculate Kim could refill Russia's ammunition inventory drained in its 18-month war with Ukraine in return for economic aid and technologies to modernize his weapons systems targeting South Korea and the U.S.

"Military cooperation between North Korea and Russia is illegal and unjust as it con-



travenes U.N. Security Council resolutions and various other international sanctions," South Korean President Yoon Suk Yeol said in written responses to questions from The Associated Press before his departure to New York to attend the U.N. General Assembly. "The international community will unite more tightly

in response to such a move." he said. In his address Wednesday at the annual U.N. gathering, Yoon will speak about his assessment of the Russian-North Korean moves, according to his office in South Korea, which added it is discussing countermeasures with the U.S., Japan and other partners.

While Russian-North Korean cooperation is feared to fuel Russia's war efforts in Ukraine, it has also stoked security jitters in South Korea, where many think a Russian transfer of sophisticated weapons technologies would help North Korea acquire a functioning spy satellite, a nuclearpowered submarine and more powerful missiles. he national bird of a country is a designated representative of that country's fauna. It is chosen on the basis of the unique qualities that the bird may symbolize. They can be a nuisance when inhabiting near farms as they prefer to feed on crop grains. They can be hunted down for the reasons stated above although that is not a common practice.

The Indian peafowl has been granted special conservation efforts owing to its status as the National Bird of India. Hunting of the national bird is illegal. Peacock symbolism: Vision, Royalty, Spirituality, Awakening, Guidance, Protection and

Watchfulness. In Greek - Roman mythology the Peacock tail has the eyes of the stars. In Hinduism, the Peacock is associated with Lakshmi who represents patience, kindness and luck

The peacock has been a prominent feature in Indian literature as its resplendent beauty is a source of inspiration for many. In popular legends, when the peacock displays its glorious plume, it's a sign of rain. They have an iconic status as the carrier animal of the Hindu God Kartikeya. Lord Krishna was always depicted with a peacock feather in his headdress. In Buddhist philosophy the peacock represents wisdom. The peacock and its feather motifs are prominent features in Mughal architecture. The peacock and the peacock feather is still a popular motif to be used in logos, textile patterns as well as designs.

The Indian peafowls are best known for the beautifully elegant display of feathers the evolution of which is believed to be driven by sexual selection. The peacocks spread their train in the shape of a fan and quivered them during the courtship display. It is believed that the number of eye spots in a male's courtship display determines his success in mating. Peafowls are omnivorous in their feeding habit and survive on insects, seeds, fruits and even small mammals. They forage on the ground in small groups which have a single male and 3-5 females

They roost as a group as well on the upper branches of a tall tree to escape predators. When agitated they will prefer to flee by running, rarely opting to take a flight. The males are surprisingly agile on foot despite the long train. The 'eyes' in the peacock's tail feathers symbolise the all-seeing Christian God and – in some interpretations – the Church. A peacock drinking from a vase is used as a symbol of a Christian believer drinking from the waters of eternal life.

Peacocks are part and parcel of our country and we like the bird for its wisdom and colorful nature. It is rightly called the National Bird of India

Goddess Kaumari, another form of Shakti also rides a peacock. Peacock is also the mount of Hindu God of war Murugan, also called Kartikeya, the brother of Ganesha. The beautiful feathers of the peacock which we all adore today once were very dull. It is believed in a battle between Ravana and Lord Indra, the bird opened its feathers for Lord Indra to hide behind and wage a war. Lord Indra was saved and in gratitude, he made peacock long feathers iridescent. That is why Lord Indra is often depicted as seated on a peacock throne.

The peacock's feather in all ages has been considered as a sign of beauty and knowledge, beauty because it is beautiful, knowledge because it is in the form of an eye. People keep the peacock feathers in their houses because it is believed that keeping peacock feather at home brings good luck and prosperity in the house.

The feather of the peacock has extraordinary powers; they give hypnotizing powers to the wearer. They stand for beauty, richness in life, Felicity and joy. The dark colours in it stand for sorrow, sadness and the bright colours for happiness. The eyes in the feathers are seen on both the sides, which commonly do not occur. It is very rare in nature. It represents the divine wisdom or the third eye of Krishna.

One is blessed with auspiciousness, wealth, health and transcendent knowledge when one worships Krishna with the



feathers on his crown. It helps one attain the supreme knowledge of the self. It symbolically states that wisdom of the mind and love of the heart makes one existence whole and for this blessed state. It represents divine love that enters the human heart and fills one's entire being in ecstasy. It also reminds us of the romantic love shared between Krishna and Radha. It is said Lord Krishna cleansed the holy feet of Radha with Peacock feathers, during their playtimes in Vrindavan.

The peacock is also considered to be a bird of protection and safeguarding. The feather protects one from evil eyes and destroys all negativity like anger, greed, and jealousy. They also have the power to get away from the bad influences of the planets. This bird is also valued as a protection for the psychic self. It brings harmony and joy to our mind. The peacock bird is majestic and proud, with much dramatic expression - the male bird dances for the sake of the female during courting, reminding us of the celebration in life.

Peacock feathers are vastly used in the Vastu Shastra too. It is said that the South direction represents Lord Kuber and if the feather of the peacock is kept on the southern side of the locker room where you keep your wealth, it increases in leaps and bounds. The peacock is also connected to rain. It is said to be able to foretell rain, by dancing before it pours. And, if a peacock cries more than usual, it is said to foretell the death of someone in the family.

Not only in Hinduism, In Christianity too, the peacock is a symbol of eternal life. The Peacock symbolism represents the "all-seeing" church, along with the holiness and sanctity associated with it. Additionally, the Peacock represents resurrection, renewal and immortality within the spiritual teachings of Christianity.


