PM attacks Rahu OVer 'litni Abadi Utna Haq'slogan

M Narendra Modi, while addressing his rally at Jagdalpur, Bastar, said, "Congress leaders have been clamouring for "Jitni Abadi Utna Haq." He pointed out that this stands in contrast with former PM Manmohan Singh's stand who used to "advocate that the minority community should hold the primary claim to the nation's resources." "Does this imply that they (Congress) intend to diminish the rights of the minority? Consequently, should the Hindu population, being the largest, step forward to assert all their

rights?" the PM said, adding that for him the welfare of the poor is the ultimate goal.

Rahul Gandhi's "jitni abadi utna haq" call raises controversy while his demand for a caste census is an attempt to find the answer. But the caste census is just cold data and only one part of the information puzzle of India's social inequality. Almost 70 per cent of Indian population are from the OBC/SC/ST castes, 15 per cent are Muslims, and 15 per cent are 'upper

fresh case has been registered by the Delhi Police Special Cell against NewsClick under the stringent Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act (UAPA). The Delhi Police are Tuesday conducting raids in at least 35 locations, including houses of seven journalists and places associated with the news portal NewsClick. The organisation is under the scanner of the Economic Offences Wing (EOW) of the Delhi Police and the Enforcement Directorate (ED) amid allegations it received funds from China.

On Tuesday morning, the Delhi Police sent their Special Cell teams to the residences of several journalists associated with the organisation. Sources said they seized devices, including laptops and mobile phones, belonging to the journalists.

Scientists Uncover Brain Signals for **Good Memory**

esearchers at the University of Basel found a direct link between activity in certain brain regions like the hippocampus and memory performance, using the world's largest functional imaging study on memory, involving nearly 1,500 participants. The findings, which revealed stronger brain activation in individuals with better memory, could impact future research linking biological characteristics to brain signals.

Individuals exhibit substantial variations in their memory capabilities. A study by the University of Basel has now identified a connection between specific brain signals and these differences in memory performance.

Although it is established that particular areas of the brain are essential for memory functions, it has remained unclear whether these regions demonstrate varying activity levels related to the storage of information in individuals with differing memory performance levels

Having investigated this matter, a research team led by Professor Dominique de Quervain and Professor Andreas Papassotiropoulos has now published its results in the journal Nature Communications.

In the world's largest functional imaging study on memory, they asked nearly 1,500 participants between the ages of 18 and 35 to look at and memorize a total of 72 images. During this process, the researchers recorded the subjects' brain activity using MRI. The participants were then asked to recall as many of the images as possible and as in the general population, there were considerable differences in memory performance among them.

Signals in brain regions and networks

In certain brain regions including the hippocampus, the research-

ers found a direct association between brain activity during the memorization process and subsequent memory performance. Individuals with a better memory showed a stronger activation of these brain areas. No such association was found for other memory-relevant brain areas in the occipital cortex - they were equally active in individuals with all levels of memory performance.

Functional networks associated with individual differences in memory performance.


The researchers were also able to identify functional networks in the brain that were linked to memory performance. These networks comprise different brain regions that communicate with each other to enable complex processes such as the storage of information.

"The findings help us to better understand how differences in memory performance occur between one individual and another," said Dr. Léonie Geissmann, the study's first author, adding that the brain signals of a single individual do not allow for any conclusions to be drawn about their memory performance, however.

According to the researchers, the results are of great importance for future research aimed at linking biological characteristics such as genetic markers to brain signals.

Basel-based research on memory

The current study forms part of a large-scale research project conducted by the Research Cluster Molecular and Cognitive Neurosciences (MCN) at the University of Basel's Department of Biomedicine and the University Psychiatric Clinics (UPK) Basel. The aim of this project is to gain a better understanding of memory processes and to transfer the findings from basic research into clinical applications.



Black Money is Big Issue

Every year, five percent GDP is going abroad due to money laundering. If GDP increases or decreases by 0.2 to 0.4 percent, it becomes a topic of discussion in the country and abroad. It is also claimed that black money has been curbed after demonetization and digitization. But according to the UN Drugs and Crime Office, in the year 2021-22, when India's GDP was more than 3 trillion dollars, in the same year USD 159 billion (about Rs 10 lakh crore) i.e., five percent of it was 'converted black money into white' abroad. This figure which eats the economy of any country like termites is scary. Another FICCI-run organization states that illegal trade, drugs, arms, terrorism and organized crime are higher in India than the average of 122 countries. According to the study, after reaching the peak in 2009, it decreased till 2014 but it continued to increase in the next four years i.e., till 2018. During the same period, tax worth Rs 1 lakh crore was evaded through import and export through fake

invoices. Black money was a big issue in the 2014 general elections. It was also promised that if BJP government is formed then this black money will be brought back. But perhaps the web of black money is so strong that it is difficult to break it, let alone reduce it. Even an organization like SEBI, after investigating a similar money laundering case on the orders of the Supreme Court, said that it had reached a dead end.

24 patients, including 12 infants, died within the span of 24 hours in Maharashtra



day after 24 patients, including 12 infants, died within the span of 24 hours at Dr Shankarrao Chavan Government Medical College and Hospital in Maharashtra's Nanded city, the state government came under fire from the Opposition for 'negligence'.

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi said, "The BJP government

spends thousands of crores of rupees on its publicity, but there is no money for medicines for children? In the eyes of BJP, the lives of the poor have no value". Meanwhile, Nationalist Congress Party (NCP) leader Supriya Sule has demanded the resignation of the health minister.

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) along with Eknath Shinde-

led Shiv Sena and Ajit Pawarled NCP is in power in the state. Seven more deaths, including four children, were reported from the state-run hospital, Congress leader Ashok Chavan claimed over the social media platform on Tuesday.

The Maharashtra government has formed a committee to probe these deaths, Minister of Medical Education of Maharashtra, Hasan Mushrif said. About 24 patients, including 12 infants, died in 24 hours between September 30 and October 1 at the state-run Dr Shankarrao Chavan Government Medical College and Hospital in Nanded city.

According to information from the hospital, six infant boys and six infant girls were among those died in 24 hours, notably higher than the average daily death toll of approximately 10 reported each day at the hospital.

Commuters in confusion as platforms numberings have been changed in panvel

The Central Railway on Tuesday changed the numbering of suburban train platforms at Panvel station in neighbouring Raigad district which led to confusion among commuters for some time.

The old platform number one will be renumbered as three, and the old platform number three renumbered as one, the CR said in a release here.

The number two platform will remain unchanged, whereas the old platform number four will be dismantled, it said.

The platform numbers were changed in view of the Panvel suburban yard remodelling work, the release said.

Panvel is one of the major railway stations in the Mumbai region with a daily footfall of around 2.5 lakh passengers. PTI

This does not automatically mean that every occupation should or will also reflect these numbers proportionally. That is, we cannot expect the proportion of people in, say, banking and sports to be 70 per cent OBC/ SC/ST, 15 per cent Muslims, and 15 per cent upper caste. Why is it that 94 per cent of senior officers in the government are upper caste while 80 per cent of the MGNREGA labourers are OBC/ SC/ST? These are legitimate questions that any society should challenge and answer.

Earlier in the day, PM Modi inaugurated and laid the foundation stones of multiple development projects worth Rs 26,000 crore in Chhatisgarh's Jagdalpur, including a Rs 23,800-crore steel plant and several rail and road projects. This is the PM's fourth visit to the Congress-ruled state since August. Meanwhile, the ruling Congress party in the pollbound state said Sunday that it was calling for a bandh in Bastar on Tuesday as a mark of protest against the privatisation of the Nagarnar steel plant.

Cultural Affairs minister Sudhir Mungantiwar signs MoU with Victoria and Albert museum for 'Tiger Claws'

aharashtra Minister for Cultural Affairs Sudhir Munganitwar on Tuesday signed a memorandum of understanding (MoU) with the Victoria and Albert (V&A) Museum in London for a 17th century 'Tiger Claws' weapon believed to have belonged to Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj make a journey back to India for a historic exhibition.

Munganitwar signed the pact with Dr Tristram Hunt, Director of the V&A, at a meeting at the museum.

"It's a day of great happiness and celebration for all of us Indians," said Munganitwar.

"The MoU is in place for the historic wagh nakh of Shivaji Maharaj to be part of our 350th anniversary celebrations. We now hope after the required processes, it will be avail-



able for our darshan in a few months' time," he said, speaking in Hindi on the sidelines of a diaspora event organised by the Maharashtra Mandal in London in celebration of the MoU signing.

Hunt hailed the "historic partnership" between the V&A, the government of Maharashtra and the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Vastu Sangrahalaya (CSMVS) museum in Mumbai, which will enable the unique object to form part of celebrations in India next year.

"Given their fascinating heritage, I hope that the displays across Maharashtra and the accompanying events will help support new research into the Tiger Claws' history and provenance," said Dr Tristram Hunt, Director of the V&A.

We look forward to working with colleagues to finalise plans in the months ahead," he

According to the V&A, the MoU sets out the details of a three-year loan agreement for the unique pair of Tiger Claws or wagh nakh in the V&A collection. They are described as an example of a weapon that was popular in the 17th century. **PTI**

NewsClick under ED scanner Delhi Police

Several journalists have been detained for questioning. The police are also conducting raids at residences and buildings attached to the news portal and its founders/editors. Raids were also conducted in Mumbai, including Teesta Setalvad's house. Meanwhile, comedian Sanjay Rajaura was taken to the Special Cell's office in Lodhi Colony for questioning

Replying to the report, NewsClick founder Prabir Purkayastha had said, "These are not new allegations. They have been made in the past. We will respond to them in the appropriate forum".

In August this year, The New York Times published an investigation alleging News-Click is among organisations funded by a network tied to US millionaire Neville Roy Singham for pushing Chinese propaganda.

Sources said the funds were received illegally and documents were not provided to the authorities. One of the journalists, Abhisar Sharma, posted on X, "Delhi police landed at my home. Taking away my laptop and Phone..."

This claim against the portal was first made by the ED in 2021 when it searched News-Click's premises as part of a probe into alleged foreign remittances. The raids are being conducted in connection with the ED investigation.

Union I&B Minister Anurag Thakur said, "The probe agencies are independent and they are doing their jobs by following rules." "I don't need to justify the raids. If someone has done something wrong, the probe agencies do their job. It's nowhere written that probe agencies can't take action if money has come to you from wrong sources or something objectionable has been done," he added, while responding to a question over the raids against NewsClick by reporters in Bhubaneswar.

'Indefinite shutdown' brings normal life to a standstill



n "indefinite shutdown" came into effect in Churachandpur district, Manipur from Monday in protest against the arrests of five Kuki-Zomi persons in connection to two cases in the last few days. The shutdown had been initiated by the Indigenous Tribal Leaders' Forum referring to their arrests as "selective haste of central investigating agencies."

Whereas, another Kuki-Zomi organisation, Committee on Tribal Unity, based in Kangpokpi district, imposed an "emergency shutdown" on National Highway 37 connecting Silchar and Imphal, to demand the release of those arrested. The body has threatened that if they are not released within 48 hours, it will impose an indefinite shutdown in Kangpokpi district as well.

In the meantime, the closure of schools and colleges in the state, which had been announced last week after tensions escalated in the state's valley areas, has now been extended till October 5. Four of the people had been arrested by the CBI on Sunday in connection with the killing of two Meitei youths who had been missing from their homes in Imphal since July 6. These arrests came after widespread and fierce protests in Meitei-dominated valley areas after the photos which appeared to show the dead bodies of the missing two students surfaced last week. Another person Seiminlun Gangte (51) had been arrested by the NIA on September 30 from Kwakta, Bishnupur in connection to an IED car blast on June 21 and a case of transnational conspiracy by Myanmar-Bangladesh-based militant groups was found during preliminary investigation.

Metro services between Yeshwanthpur and Sampige Road on Green line to resume after 3 pm



he Bengaluru Metro's Green Line between Yeswantpur and Mantri Square Sampige Road stations was disrupted, causing passengers a huge inconvenience at the metro stations. Speaking to The Indian Express, Anjum Parvez, MD of BMRCL said, "Normalcy of train services on the green line between Yeshwanthpur and Sampige Road will resume after 3 pm BMRCL will use a crane to lift the road rail vehicle between 2 to

3 pm, which broke down due to technical snag near Rajajinagar metro station."

Meanwhile, a day after BJP leader and Bengaluru South MP Tejasvi Surya requested the removal of a 'ban' on carpooling, Karnataka Transport Minister Ramalinga Reddy on Monday said that the government has not issued any fresh order on 'carpooling ban' but stakeholders will need to take permission to operate such services in the city.

Bengal at top in terms of demand for two schemes over which Centre funds stopped

S THE Trinamool Congress holds a protest in Delhi over the Centre stopping release of funds under Union government schemes to West Bengal, ferrying hundreds of leaders and workers from the state for the purpose, official data shows that for two of the schemes in question, Bengal was at the top in demand.

As per the data, 51-80 lakh

families availed the MNREGS, which guarantees 100 days of work in rural areas per family, annually between 2014-15 and 2021-22. In terms of number of families, this meant that West Bengal stood first among all states and Union Territories in 2015-16; second on five occasions – 2014-15, 2016-17, 2017-18, 2020-21 and 2021-22 – third in 2019-20; and fourth in 2018-19.

of 3:53.329 seconds to bag the third place. In men's cricket, India overcame the Nepalese challenge. With 60 medals -13 of which are gold – already in their corner, Team India will begin journey in another gold contention event.

In Athletics, India will have an opportunity to increase their tally with Tejaswin Shankar leading in the men's decathlon and Vithya Ramraj in women's 400m hurdles.

In a massive crackdown against child marriage, Assam Police arrested 800 people

ore than 800 people have been arrested since early Tuesday morning after the Assam police began a second round of crackdown against child marriage in the state, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said, adding that the number of arrests is likely to increase.

"In a massive crackdown against child marriage, Assam Police has arrested over 800 accused persons in a special operation which began in the early hours of dawn," he announced on X, formerly Twitter.

This is the second such sweeping crackdown by the state government this year. In February, the Assam government had launched an unprecedented punitive crackdown against child marriage in the state in which



3,141 people had been arrested within a span of a month, which included men who had married underage girls as well as family members and religious leaders who allegedly facilitated these. Sarma has earlier stated that this second round of arrests will be specifically targeted at those who have participated in child marriage in the period after the last crackdown earlier this year.

The job requires 84 to 96 hours of work a week, followed by a whole week off. The nanny is supposed to coordinate with "a dedicated team including a Chef, Nannies, a Housekeeper, and Private Security" in order

to provide "a seamless daily routine for the children." The person will also be responsible to "curate" the boys' "play areas, toys, and clothing to foster a stimulating and organised environment."

Though the client's name is not listed in the advertisement, multiple details point strongly to the Ramaswamy family, as per Business Insider. Tricia McLaughlin, a spokesperson for Mr Ramaswamy's campaign, had earlier told the news portal that the family is not okay with the idea of livein nannies. Mr Ramaswamy is a frontrunner along with former US President Donald Trump to face Joe Biden in 2024 polls.

The Indian-origin Republican candidate was once addressed as "Trump's heir apparent" by Time Magazine. He has garnered quite an attention after his maiden Republican presidential primary debate held on August 23.

Indian Billionaire Harpal Randhawa, 22-Year-Old Son **Killed In Zimbabwe Plane Crash**



ndian billionaire and mining tycoon Harpal Randhawa and his 22-year-old son Amer were among six people who died in a plane crash in Zimbabwe on September 29, as per a PTI report. The tragic incident occurred when their private plane crashed near a diamond mine in southwestern Zimbabwe after experiencing a technical fault

Notably, Harpal Randhawa is

the owner of RioZim, a diversified mining company producing gold and coal as well as refining nickel and copper. Mr Randhawa also founded the \$4-billion private equity business GEM Holdings.

The mining tycoon and his son were traveling in a Cessna 206 aircraft, privately owned by RioZim. They were en route from Harare to the Murowa diamond mine when the accident happened. The single-engined aircraft crashed near the Murowa Diamonds mine, which is partly owned by RioZim. All passengers and crew onboard died in the accident. Meanwhile, the local community and law enforcement agencies are working together to manage the aftermath of the plane crash.

The recognition highlights the crucial significance of their research on nucleoside base modifications, which played a vital role in the swift creation of these vaccines during the pandemic.

The Nobel Laureates' discoveries have had a transformative impact on our understanding of how mRNA interacts with the immune system, enabling the unprecedented speed of vaccine development during one of the most significant health crises in recent history.

Vaccination, as a result of



their work, now triggers the formation of an immune response against specific pathogens, providing the body with a crucial defense mechanism for future encounters with these threats. These annual Nobel Prizes, which encompass physics, chemistry, medicine, literature, and peace, are rooted in the will of Alfred Nobel, the Swedish inventor

known for dynamite, who passed away in 1896. In 1968, the Nobel Prize in Economic Sciences was established by Sweden's central bank. The Nobel laureates for these prestigious awards are traditionally unveiled in Stockholm during October, except for the Peace Prize, which is determined by the Norwegian Nobel Committee in Oslo.'

This is because, the barrier created by a cascaded mountain range restricts flow of clouds for a longer time, thus giving more time for rain formation. If the barrier is small, like an isolated mountain, the water droplets are carried away to the other side of the mountain and rain on windward side is less. Since Karnataka has a cascade mountain range in the
