Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Sanjay Raut has been charged with sedition for writing an upfront article against Prime Minister Modi 'Saamana', as claimed in the complaint by BJP Yavatmal convener Nitin Bhutad. The article was published on December 11. Raut has now been booked under several sections of the Indian Penal Code.

The case was registered on Monday at Umarkhed police station against Raut under IPC sections 124 (A) (sedition), 153 (A) (promoting enmity between different groups on grounds of religion, race, place of birth, residence, language, etc) and 505 (2) (statements creating or promoting enmity, hatred or ill-will between classes).

Police officer told Afternoon Voice that

"We have registered the case as per the complaint and will conduct a probe into it.

When asked Sanjay Raut he said "I don't know why the case has been registered against me. In this country press freedom is at stake and government hates criticism."

The media was never biased towards BJP, rather there is a big social media and mainstream media group that impatiently attacks BJP and its leaders. The media was always biased towards the Ruling Party of the time. Since BJP is ruling India now, the media naturally supports BJP. BJP does not control "all" media. So it goes against their grain not to be supportive of the ruling party in their media presentations. Same goes with most of the journalists, who feel it convenient to fall in line either to enjoy some inducements, or at least to avoid any harassment in the discharge of their journalistic activity. This applies to all ruling parties, whether the present BJP or the Congress in the earlier decades. Only the inducements/ threats might be sometimes overt but most of the times more covert and subtle.

Very few media houses and journalists show some spine to stand up for their professional independence and courage of convictions. If BJP has dedicated media barons as their flag bearers then we should know that the nexus of congress is also very strong that you can't imagine. They have their people everywhere even the paid historians who have written the history in childhood books of NCERT are in their favour. They too have their nexus with editors and writers who threw the word like ISI for RSS in the media when congress was at high pitch.

When Congress was in power almost all pro-BJP (or even centre-right ideologues) journalists were thrown out of their jobs due to pressure from the ruling party. Many journalists were arrested for the anti-Congress voices. No opposition was ever kind to the media because they blamed them for the ruling party's lap dogs. Remember the great venerable Ramnath Goenka, frustrated and broken by repeated I-T raids and ED investigations ultimately had to fire Arun Shourie twice from the Indian Express, which was once the best Indian newspaper in the 1970s and 80s. That was the team — Goenka the owner, Shourie the editor, and S. Gurumurthy the fearless journalist, that brought political heavyweights like Indira Gandhi down on her knees and even took on corporate honchos like Dhirubhai Ambani.

Very few centre-right ideologues then existed in Indian media, that too in minor publications. Almost all the mainstream media houses were thoroughly infiltrated and coerced into towing the Congress' line, sometimes just through ideology and relationships, and not even money power.

The Congress party essentially owned and controlled every single mainstream media house in India, including Hindustan Times, The Times of India, NDTV, CNN-IBN, The Hindu,

Tehelka, Outlook, etc. When BJP came to power the first thing they straightened was anti BJP campaigners. See I have a small media house which is considered to be a parallel media. We don't fit into mainstream media either by our reach nor by our size, but still the constructive criticism made by us is accepted by BJP and its leaders. We were never under pressure to speak the truth, be it against the BJP. PM Modi rather volunteered saying the media should make constructive criticism so that the ruling party can improvise on various fronts.

There is a stark gap in trust among supporters of political parties in news outlets. Patterns of news consumption differed among supporters of the ruling BJP and opposition parties. It is claimed that the most readers of English newspapers support the Congress, while consumers of Hindi news seem to incline towards the BJP. The proportion of individuals that mostly read the newspaper in English is around 3% but among this tiny segment, the Congress enjoys the most support. This is not the case among readers who read newspapers in other languages.

We have to believe that the Modi government is favourably sought in the Indian news media. Media is made of people who deal a lot with politics or politicians. And it's natural that they are still towards one or the other ideology. We are in a very complicated political environment where deciding what is right and what is wrong is difficult. Every event has multiple facets to it and it depends on the reporter as to what he sees and what he wants to show. But calling journalists a prestitute, Bazaru, bikau, darbaari or party workers is not new in Indian politics. What people need to understand is that they are served what they want to buy, and the media needs to realise that they still need a balance.

Awareness to the students has to come from parents as well as teachers who need to make them aware of historical facts of the country, current issues, social issues, international issues, development in science and technology. This makes the students to go through the general knowledge books, magazines, news papers with keen interest to know what it is then and what happens next.

Knowledge is power and by inculcating knowledge the future of children will be at the top of the world. Mall culture has come to stay in India in general and Mumbai in particular. Most kids enjoy doing inversions like sirsasana, as it calms them down by reducing the tempo of your breathing, and sends blood to the shoulders, neck and brain, areas that you should be relaxing. This should be done with support, with a parent, against the wall. Simple rhythmic breathing helps increase focus and memory power, and reduces anxiety. One deep breath, followed by one short breath.

Running, cycling, swimming, walking, dancing and playing sports such as cricket, badminton, football, or basketball, all pump up cardiovascular activities, even if children have just 40 minutes for it. On days that they don't have a lot of time, help them find at least 15 minutes for light exercise, whatever they enjoy doing. Stretching at least once every hour is important.

The mere act of moving about, doing whatever eases the mind, whether it's playing games or walking and gossiping with friends, or riding a cycle alone, counts as free play. There is absolute need for children to relax during their study time. Playing few games of chess or playing carrom board for half an hour will provide the children the much needed relaxation. It is time to practice good habits during the summer vacation so that the children can maintain in the same vein when their regular school commences in a couple of months. Mind game for children is the most effective tool to be inculcated by children on regular basis.

he special cell of Delhi Police has busted an interstate syndicate of firearms traffickers and arrested three of its key members including the manufacturer. 11 semi-automatic pistols were recovered from them.


Arrested persons would procure the firearms from Madhya Pradesh and supply the same to criminals in Delhi/NCR and Uttar Pradesh. A team of SR/Special Cell, led by Inspector Ranjeet Singh and Satvinder Singh, under the supervision of ACP

Ved Parkash, busted the syndicate by arresting three of its key members who have been identified as Vimal Kumar (19) from Prayagraj, Sumit Kumar (19) from Prayagraj and Amarjeet Singh (35) from Khargone, MP. "After sustained efforts for more than four months, some of the members of this interstate firearm syndicate were identified. On December 4, 2023, specific information was received that two members of this arms syndicate, namely Vimal Kumar and Sumit Kumar, had procured a consignment of pistols from Khargone, MP, and they had brought the same to Delhi.

As per information, they were supposed to meet one Delhi-based arms trafficker near the Pul Prahladpur underpass, M.B. Road, New Delhi, in the afternoon to deliver the pistols," the special cell of Delhi Police said. Accordingly, a raiding team led by Inspector Ranjeet Singh was constituted, and a trap was laid near the Pul Prahladpur underpass, M.B. Road, New Delhi.

"At about 1.30 pm, Vimal Kumar and Sumit Kumar were spotted coming towards the Pul Prahladpur underpass, and they were overpowered by the police team. During the search, 10 semiautomatic pistols were recovered from the duo," the police further stated. On interrogation, it was revealed that the pistols were procured from an arms supplier in Khargone, MP, and were to be supplied to the members of the Hashim Baba gang in Delhi. ANI

Kerala Governor stands against CM Pinarayi Vijayan over protest



erala Governor Arif Mohammed Khan on Tuesday hardened his stand against Pinarayi Vijayan over the Student Federation of India's (SFI) ongoing stir against him, reiterating that it was a "conspiracy" hatched by the Chief Minister while the protesters were acting as per his "instructions". Just because the state government is led by the communists, Kerala does not become a totalitarian or a dictatorial state and "law shall prevail" there, he said. Khan was speaking to reporters in New Delhi a day after he accused the CM of 'conspiring' to hurt him physically.

He noted that if anybody tries to overhaul the Governor, it is a cognizable offence and has to be dealt with under section 124 of IPC. The Governor said he has already sent messages to the Chief Secretary and the state DGP making it clear that mere hauling up was not enough. "This conspiracy has been hatched by the Chief Minister. It is as per his instruction, these people are working," Khan charged. "Who's the Home Minister? The Chief Minister... Everything is being done as per his direction. It is he who has hatched this conspiracy and three days before these things happened, he made a public statement...," he said. He further said it is the start of the collapse of the Constitutional machinery in Kerala. Recounting the dramatic protest against him on Monday, Khan said if it was not a highend car, the windows would have shattered, PTI

Kerala: MP's staged a protest over security issue faced by people at Sabarimala pilgrims

erala MPs held a protest in front of Mahatma Gandhi's statue in Parliament demanding security for Sabarimala pilgrims. The protesting MPs demanded basic facilities, safety and security for pilgrims at Sabarimala.

NK Premachandran, a leader of the Revolutionary Socialist Party (RSP), said, "Sabarimala is one of the prominent pilgrimage sites in the country, with lakhs of pilgrims visiting the shrine every year. Hence, it is unfortunate that no arrangement has been made by the state government to provide necessary facilities for devotees. The pilgrims are forced to wait 18 hours for a darshan (sighting of the deity). No medical facilities, drinking water, and transport facilities are available. Sufficient police protection is also not available for the security and safety of the pilgrims." He added that a girl, aged 8 years, died standing in the queue and yet, the ruling Left Democratic



Front (LDF) government took no proactive step for the protection of

"Only 600 police personnel have been deployed there. We are demanding that sufficient protection be provided to the pilgrims. We demand an urgent intervention by the National Disaster Management Authority. We are also planning to stage a dharna in the House (Assembly) today. We have all given an adjournment notice for the same," he added. Abdul Basheer from IUML said

that the protest was in the interest of the safety of the pilgrims. "Sabarimala is the biggest centre of pilgrimage in South India. However, the government is not taking any steps to ensure the safety of pilgrims visiting the shrine. We have made several requests (to the government to ensure the safety of devotees). We even want to bring it to the notice of the public. The government should take immediate steps to ensure the safety of Sabarimala pilgrims," he added. ANI

Anti-Semitism case in US: Hundreds of faculty at Harvard University signed a petition in backing the school president



undreds of faculty at the Harvard University have signed a petition backing the school's president following backlash over her appearance at a congressional hearing on rising anti-Semitism in the US, Al Jazeera reported. The petition says that bowing to political pressure to fire Harvard President Claudine Gay would be "at odds with Harvard's commitment to academic freedom". The petition called on the administrators to "defend the independence of the university"

The petition signed by more

than 500 professors said: "The critical work of defending a culture of free inquiry in our diverse community cannot proceed if we let its shape be dictated by outside forces." The petition, which was first reported by The Boston Globe, was delivered on Sunday to the 13-member Harvard Corporation, which is empowered to remove Gay. Gay has faced a lot of criticism since she and two other university heads repeatedly failed to give a definitive "yes" or "no" answer to the question of whether calls for the genocide of Jews would violate university policy.

During their appearance before a US House of Representatives committee hearing on anti-Semitism on campuses last week, Gay and the presidents of the University of Pennsylvania and Massachusetts Institute of Technology said that whether such calls breached bullying and harassment policies would depend on the context, as per Dawn.

On Friday, Gay apologised for getting caught up in "an extended, combative exchange about policies and procedures" and not more clearly stating that calls for violence against Jews have no place on campus. Recently, the University of Pennsylvania President Elizabeth Magill stepped down from her role after earlier releasing a video expressing regret over her testimony. More than 70 US lawmakers, both Democrats and Republicans, have added their names to a letter demanding the removal of the three university presidents. ANI

Pakistan: Family members affected by floods are still waiting for relief from the govt



majority of the families affected by floods last year are still awaiting relief from the government, as many are forced to live without houses. The southeastern province of Sindh in Pakistan was one of the hardest-hit areas by the 2022 floods.

According to Jang, an Urdu daily, money has been given to only about 3 lakh people out of 21 lakh victims across the province, while the fourth installment has not yet been released to a single victim

"Even today, the flood victims in the districts are forced to live under the open sky and in huts," said Jung. According to the details, houses and other structures belonging to lakhs of people were destroyed due to floods in Sindh province. In this regard, with the support of the World Bank and the federal government, the government of Sindh started a programme to release 3 lakh Pakistan rupees in four installments for building houses for more than 20 lakh flood victims, but due to the negligence of the relevant departments, the said programme was on the brink of failure.

According to the information received by "Jang," in Sindh province, one installment of 75 thousand Pakistan rupees has been issued to 2 lakh victims, the second installment to around 70 thousand victims, the third installment to only 15 thousand victims, and the fourth installment has not been issued to any victim. **ANI**

Pok: Teachers, administrative staff staged a protest demanding salary hike

he academic and administrative staff of five universities in PoK are protesting to demand their pending salary hike. The teaching process has been suspended as universities are not being given their due funds. The government has received multiple appeals from the employees, but their demands have not been met. The employees have made it clear that they would continue to demonstrate until their due pay raises are granted.

"We had been given a green signal that our salary would be increased. Then suddenly we were told that a new committee was being formed at the government level which would take the decision. The increase of 30 to 35 per cent is the basic right of the employees which should be given to them. We have waited for

five months on this matter" one of the protesting teachers said.

In June, the Vice Chancellors of the five public sector universities in PoK met with the chairman of the Higher Education Commission in Islamabad. They had voiced their worries about the financial and administrative problems that universities are facing. However, nothing has been done till now. Teachers who are protesting claim they are being discriminated against, while officials in other departments are receiving increased salaries. "Our incentive was stopped and we remained silent, our honorarium was stopped, we remained silent and our publication amount of PKR 5000 was also not given. Now the administration is cutting our relief fund" a woman teacher was heard saying. ANI

Afghanistan: More than 345,000 citizen have been deported from Iran in two months

ore than 345,000 Afghans have been deported from Iran to Afghanistan in over two Afghanistan-based months. TOLO News reported, citing a senior official of the Taliban-led Ministry of Refugees and Repatriation. Abdul Rahman Rashid, Taliban-appointed Deputy Minister of Refugees and Repatriation, said, "Since the first of Mizan (23rd September) till 17 Qaws (December 8) there were approximately 345,000. Each family has been provided with 10,000 Afs in cash assistance by the Islamic Emirate "

Mohammad Yousuf and Fatih Khan, who left Afghanistan and went to Iran to make both ends meet, have been deported from Iran. They complained about the mistreatment of Afghan refugees by Iranian



forces, according to TOLO News report. Yousuf said, "There was no work here, then we went to Iran through illegal paths. They beat us and detained us." Khan said, "They captured us and beat us. They beat us badly and forced us to return." The deportees raised concerns regarding the lack of employment in Afghanistan and urged the Taliban to make efforts to

create jobs for the citizens.

Shirin Agha, a deportee, said, "We call on our government to provide us with work so the people are not forced to leave." Ahmadullah, a deportee, called on Taliban to provide them with work. This comes as Iranian officials have said that Afghans without legal documents will be deported from Iran, TOLO News reported. **ANI**

The Hostel Life - Advantages and Disadvantages - I

hostel is a place where usually students live and which is supervised by an administration and living in those hostels is called the hostel life. Hostels are aimed at providing budget-oriented, sociable accommodation for students. In a hostel, usually a bunk bed, in a dormitory and share a bathroom, lounge and a kitchen or a mess are provided. Rooms are usually singlesex, although private rooms may also be available for the students who are studying doctorate or PhD level in universities. Hostels are generally aimed at providing an economical and healthy environment for the students that is also safe for them. In a hostel room, it is very important to take care with personal belongings, as other students may share a common living space and things that look alike, so it is advisable to secure your belongings. Most hostels offer some sort of system for safely storing valuables and an increasing number of hostels offer private lockers.

It has been observed that there is less privacy in a hostel room for students as compared to their stay at home, PG or in a private room than in a hotel. Hostels encourage more social interaction between the students due to the shared sleeping areas and communal areas such as lounges, kitchens and internet cafes. Hostels have provision for gymnasium where the hostellers can take morning exercise and building their bodies. There are a reading room and library attached to the hostel to enable the students to study books, newspapers and computer Internet. In a nutshell, the hostel not only cares for the health of the students but also their studies.

The life in a hostel is completely different from that of the home. The greatest blessing of hostel life is an independent life. Students tend to get an independent atmosphere and learn to take decisions of their own. A student may sleep in a hostel



whenever he likes to. You may get up late in the morning but none will question you. During your hostel life, no one is after you repeatedly asking you to study unlike at home, which gives you a great sense of responsibility. Apart from the general rules and regulations of the hostel, which are to be followed necessarily by everyone, one is his own master and learns to control his life. It is due to this reason that many students do not like to go home even on long vacations. Those who love freedom love the hostel life.

History of Hostel Life

In 1912, in Altena Castle in Germany, Richard Schirrmann created the first permanent Youth Hostel. These first Youth Hostels were an exponent of the ideology of the German Youth Movement to let poor city youngsters breathe fresh air outdoors. These hostels were not like modern day's hostels and youths were supposed to manage the hostel themselves as much as possible. Living students or inmates themselves were doing chores to keep the costs down and build character as well as being physically active outdoors. Because of this, many Youth Hostels closed during the middle part of the day. Very few hostels still require chores beyond washing up after selfcatered meals or have a "lockout".

Hostelling spread fast. Thousands of hostels opened over the next two decades. In 1932, the first international hostel conference was held in Amsterdam. At the conference, the Youth Hostel Federation (YHF) was formed to unite hostel groups

from across Europe. Two years after the YHF was established, the first US hostel opened in Northfield, Massachusetts. And from then onwards the concept of modern hostel culture for students begin to pick up and resulted in modern hostels of the present. Hostels haven't changed much in their hundred-plus year history. They remain an empowering, affordable means of accommodation.

Hostel Life Vs Home Life - Comparison

Hostel life can be a very pleasant journey. In a hostel, many students almost of the same age live together who are studying almost in the same class or year. Thus students of same nature develop great intimacy among themselves while they get their freedom and develop a sense of self-responsibility. Studying and living together develop a great sense of oneness among them and grows a spirit of co-operation and fellowfeeling among them. They help one another in case of need. Also if one needs to study on his own, there are separate study rooms or reading rooms provided where they can study peacefully and in case of any doubt can consult fellow hostellers. To earnest students, it is a better place for studies. They are free here. On the other hand at home, they are for most of the time occupied by some of the other domestic duties which interfere with their studies a lot. But therein hostel students can go on with their studies without any interruption.

It is very obvious that the life at home cannot be compared to the life in a hostel; both are really opposite face of the coin. Hostel life is full of fun, amusement and youthfulness and an individual are constantly in a touch of people of his age on the other hand at home one has to live as other members of the family live and elders are always there to check the activities of youngsters. At home one has to go on according to the family that includes sleeping time, eating time and time for leisure. One cannot even frame one's own timetable of studies. One has to keep in mind the convenience of others also. One has to study while others keep on talking and gossiping. Whereas in a hostel students discuss their lessons and help one another in the matter of studies. They can remember a thing well by mutual discussion. Moreover, even non-studious students are induced to read when they see that others are reading.


At home, there is no atmosphere for serious studies. There is constant disturbance due to one reason or the other. The life in a hostel is completely different from that of the home on this issue as there is a provision for a separate study room or reading room for those who want to study in peace. The greatest blessing of hostel life is independence. You may sleep whenever you like. Sometimes social functions are also held in hostel and students take part in these. These develop in them a sense of responsibility, culture and refinement. In the hostel, students have to take care of their own things. They don't do this at home. All these develop in them a spirit of self-reliance.
